Heat Exhaustion is Real

With the increasing heat and humidity here in SW Floridal, now is a good time for a reminder about the dangers of heat exhuastion. Being outside on our boats or on the beach on a hot day in the sun can be dangerous if you're not prepared. According to the Mayo Clinic, quite simply, heat exhaustion is a condition that happens when your body overheats. Besides the hot weather and strenuous activity, dehydration, alcohol use and overdressing can cause heat exhaustion. Symptoms may include heavy sweating and rapid pulse. Heat exhuation is one of the three heat-related illnesses, with heat cramps being the mildest and heatstroke being the most serious. Without prompt treatment, heat exhaution can lead to heatstroke. Symptoms of heat exhaustion are: heavy sweating, faintness, dizziness, fatigue, weak, rapid pulse, cool/moist skin with goose bumps when in the heat, low blood pressure upon standing, muscle cramps, nausea and headache.

Thankfully there are some quick things you can do to treat heat exhaustion including resting in a cool place, drinking cool fluids and easy cooling measures. Our squadron member, Mike Carter provided a tip he learned from his nine years working in EMS as a first responder in Maryland that we can all easily use in case we ever encounter someone in heat distress. Mike suggests having four freezer packs as seen in the below picture. If someone is suffering from heat distress, give them water and put one cool pack in each armpit and one in each side of the groin area and close the arms and legs. This is a quick way for the blood to transport the coolness to the body core. As a reminder, only give fluids if the person is conscious to avoid choking.

SEO's Notebook: Are You Prepared?

As much as I dislike reminding everyone, June 1st will be here before you know it. It's time to get your hurricane plan in place. Regardless of whether an above average or below average hurricane season is predicted, it only takes one to make things difficult. To aid in getting your vessel ready, please attend our annual Hurricane Preparation for Boaters seminar on May 14, 2025 at 2 PM in Squadron Room 101. If you can't make it, here are some suggestions for getting your vessel secured.

To get started, remove all covers, mats, and cushions, as well as lower the radio antenna to a horizontal position. If you have an open cockpit some of your electronics may have protective covers. Remove those, as well. Empty all the external lockers of their contents. Remove drain plug (if your boat has one) and shut down all electrical system, including disconnecting the batteries and any shore power.

Are you going to leave your boat on the lift? If so, be sure to raise the lift cradle as high as practical. And remove the lift canopy if you have one. Keep the lift from swinging by securing the cradle to the dock pilings at least four points. The biggest source of destroyed boats is the lift swinging in the wind and crashing against the pilings. The pilings will eventually fail, causing the lift and everything on it to come crashing down. Many DIY solutions are available, as well as commercially available one to accomplish this. And be sure that your boat is strapped to the lift cradle. Use 2" DOT certified cargo ratchets and straps (like what are used on flatbed trucks).

If you're keeping the boat in the water, be sure to double-up on your lines. Set all your bow, stern, and spring lines on port and starboard, for a total of sixteen. If you are in a slip, attach fenders every 2-3 ft. to mitigate any collisions with the dock. And leave enough slack to accommodate storm surge. Also be prepared for the eventuality of water receding and potentially grounding your boat (as what happened in 2017 during Hurricane Irma).

Boats on trailers should either be placed in a hurricane resistant enclosure or strapped to the ground. Strapping to ground is a non-trivial endeavor and requires preparation. This solution requires either concrete footings or large diameter and long "tent" stakes to which the heavy-duty ratchet straps are attached.

So, unless you have access to a hurricane resistant boat shelter, you'll likely need to employ one of the methods described. Your vessel can survive with minimal damage if proper precautions are taken.

Only one merit mark may be awarded in a year to a member, no matter how extensive the contribution."

A good way to earn a Merit Mark, and serve your community by ensuring all boaters/vessels are aware of and in compliance with current safety standards; is to become a certified Vessel Safety Examiner(VSE). We are in need of additional CCSAPS members to becomes VSE's as our numbers are declining due to current VSE's moving, retiring etc. Below is a list of items required to become a certified VSE. You must be active member of CCSAPS to become a VSE.

VESSEL SAFETY CHECK

& BoatUS

General Steps to Becoming a Vessel Examiner

1. Contact your Squadron VSC Chair. (Craig Buechler)

2. Download/print latest VSC manual. (US Coast Guard Vessel Safety Check Manual COMDTINST M16796.8A Oct 2014 which can be found on National's Website Vessel Safety Check page.)

3. Study, put it under your pillow, etc.

4. When you think that you are ready, take the test on line. (Found on National's Website, *Become a Vessel Examiner*)

5. Upon completion of test, and receiving passing grade, email results to SQN VSC Chair (craigbuechler@yahoo.com)

6. Request Squadron Chair to schedule/perform 5 joint Vessel Safety Checks with a qualified CCSAPS Vessel Examiner.

7. Once you have completed 5 joint inspections, email SQN VSC Chair, and I will submit the VSC-2 form to National.

8. Congratulations! You now are a qualified VE and go out and inspect to your hearts content. Decals and inspection forms will be provided to you upon request.

Once you are a certified Vessel Examiner, you will wear the uniform during your safety checks: o Red "USPS uniform polo shirt" with words "Vessel Examiner" and USPS logo on it. Eduardo Lamberti, www.emprintpac.com, 239-205-5967 will do this for a nominal fee. Or it can be obtained through National Website if desired.

o Tan/khaki colored pants (long or short), comfortable boat shoes and optional VSC cap . o Inflatable Life Jackets should be worn as a normal part of uniform to illustrate the ease of always wearing a life jacket whenever on the water. Inflatable Life Jackets are supplied by Squadron.

We can use all the VSE's that we can get, as there are a lot of boats in our area. If you have any further questions or needs, please feel free to contact Craig Buechler and thank you for your consideration.


