Early Birds: Burrowing Owl Nesting Season Reaches its Peak Chad Gillis, News-Press

The burrowing owl nesting season is hitting its peak, just in time for some public celebrations centered around Cape Coral's official bird. More than 3,000 of these pint-sized birds can be found in the city, and support groups and government organizations hold events to raise public awareness about the threatened species.

"The babies are starting to pop up, but there is increasing pressure to build and that puts more pressure on nesting owls," said Janet Windisch, spokeswoman for Cape Coral Friends of Wildlife. "We're trying to purchase land as fast as we can and we're trying to get people to start burrows in their yard. That's our defense against loss of habitat."

Breeding season is typically Feb. 15 through July 10, although the local population appears to be nesting early this year, Windisch said.

Listed at threatened by the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission, or FWC, burrowing owls moved to the Cape Coral area in droves during the 1960s, when the area was cleared of trees and canals cut to help drain the land. FWC is the state agency charged with protecting threatened and endangered animals, such as the burrowing owl.

The population here has grown since, with the owls making nests on cleared lots, even road medians.

Burrowing owls are among the smallest of owls in

the Sunshine State, and they're known for their large yellow eyes, brown back feathers and white chins.

"The burrowing owl spends most of its time on the ground, where its sandy brown plumage provides camouflage from potential predators," and FWC website reads. "It averages nine inches in height with a wingspan of 21 inches. The burrowing owl lacks the ear tufts of the more familiar woodland owls. Unusually long legs provide additional height for a better view from its typical ground-level perch."

"Females lay up to eight eggs within a one-week period, and they will incubate the eggs for up to 28 days," an FWC website says. "Once the white-feathered juveniles are born, it takes two weeks before they are ready and able to appear out of the burrow. Juveniles will begin learning how to fly at four weeks, but will not be able to fly well until they are six weeks old."

Windisch said the best way to see burrowing owls is to visit parks like the Pelican Baseball Complex and the Cape Coral library.

Provided you do not remove any equipment, you'll have peace of mind knowing you have the required equipment in an emergency and know where it's located in the event you need it or are inspected by boating law enforcement.

What are the benefits of a VSC?

The VSC can identify SAFETY and money saving opportunities:

1-By meeting federal, state, and local safety equipment requirements you will prevent equipment related citations.

2-You may receive a boating insurance discount from your insurance provider.

3-By increasing awareness of safety practices you may avoid accidents and costly breakdowns.

4-The VSC can reduce accidents by educating the boater about the value and use of safety equipment and safe practices on the water.

Boat Canopies

At the February 28th meeting of the Cape Coral Council's Committee of the Whole a proposal was made to change the city ordnance 5.4.7 governing Boat Canopies and Sun Shelters to allow for hard topped canopies to be installed in the canals. Other cities in the area allow these, Ft. Myers Beach being one of them.

Councilman Bill Steinke is behind this idea and, according to reporting in the Cape Coral Breeze, he believes it would benefit seasonal residents by hardening their properties. Other members of the council seemed skeptical based on the damage we all saw after Hurricane Ian.

It will be fun watching this idea progress. A copy of the presentation and video of the discussion can be found on the city's website.

Flare Disposal

In California, a new bill was recently introduced, SB 1066: The Marine Flare Producer Responsibility Act. According to the state senator that introduced the legislation "In 2023, it cost an estimated \$185.00 to properly dispose of one unwanted marine flare, which can be purchased new for approximately \$13.00."

The goal of the legislation is to require producers of marine flares to fund and operate a convenient collection system to manage expired or unwanted flares.

If you are looking to dispose of old flares locally in Florida, Lee County operates a Household Hazardous Waste drop off site at Lee County Household Chemical Waste Collection Facility at 6441 Topaz Court (off Metro Pkwy) in Fort Myers.

Some of our members are switching to the United States Coast Guard approved electronic SOS beacons in place of flares. The approved beacons, along with a distress flag and whistle will fulfil your carriage requirements for visual distress signals. If you are thinking purchasing one of the electronic devices there are several manufactures to choose from. If you get a vessel safety check our vessel examiners can provide you with a coupons good for 20% off one safety item from West Marine.

Senate Bill 30 Change to Boating Education Requirements

As of March 8, 2024, SB30 is noted on the Florida Senate website to have "Died in Transportation." So, it looks as if, for the second year in a row, the proposed changes to who needs a Boating Education I.D. Card remain unchanged.

CCSAPS ANNOUNCES NEW LOCAL WATERS BOATING SEMINAR

Since 1964, CCSAPS has been an active participant in the Cape Coral community. The club provides a variety of education, social and community service activities to our members and the public at large.

Boaters new to Southwest Florida find our waterways "different" and many that stop by our booth at the Farmer's Market ask lots of questions. In response, CCSAPS has created a new seminar for boaters that are new to Southwest Florida.

The Southwest Florida Boating Primer is a seminar that runs approximately 90-minutes and is designed to help boaters understand how the commercial development in Ft. Myers and the draining of the Everglades had both positive and negative impacts on how and where we can boat. It also looks at why it's important to know how to read a chart, understand the impacts of river current, tidal current and winds can have on your boating experience.

Other topics include, a discussion of how being in a Federally Protected Manatee Area impacts how and where we can boat and the impact of being on the Intracoastal Waterway system which can cause confusion for even seasoned boaters.

During the second half of the seminar, we will look at some of the more popular areas boaters like to visit. Some of these places have more than one way to get into them and the shortcuts you see others use may not always be the best option for you boat or current skills.

After the seminar, members of the club will be on hand to answer questions about boating and how our organization is working to make boating safe for everyone in our community.

The seminar will be held on **Thursday April**, **18th at 7:00 P.M.** and again on Monday May 1st at 7:00 P.M. Both sessions will be held at the Cape Coral Sail and Power Squadron, located at 917 SE 47th Terrace, Cape Coral FL 33904, in room 202.

Learn how predict short term weather conditions by just feeling the wind and looking at the clouds. Don't get caught by surprise by one of our summer squalls.



FISHING GROUP

Presentation to the Fishing Group from Florida Wildlife Commission (FWC) Officers

At our last meeting, two Florida Wildlife Commission (FWC) Officers, Lt. Barrett and Officer Hurst updated us about all the new regulatory changes involving fishing in our area. These officers cover Lee and Charlotte Counties; their troop strength is presently a Lt. and six officers, with some vacancies to be filled.

The biggest change in fishing regulations recently involves Goliath groupers. These huge fish have been protected for many years and, after some heated debates, now have a small season. The Goliath grouper population has rebounded to the point that there has been a robust catch and release fishery under the bridges. Many fishermen even report having their catches stolen right by the boat by these behemoths. To catch and keep a Goliath grouper, you need to obtain a permit, through a lottery, much like the alligator lottery. There are 200 permits each year statewide, with a limit of one Goliath per person. The Goliaths that may be taken have a slot size of 24 to 36 inches in length and can be caught from March 1 to May 31 with the permit. People can still fish for Goliath grouper on a catch and release basis (the Sanibel Causeway is loaded with them), but anglers are cautioned not to remove these fish from the water as, due to their weight, damage can be done to their internal organs if you do.

Other groupers in the region have new regulations, too. There is an aggregate limit of four groupers per day per angler among red, black, and gag groupers. Two red groupers over 20 inches, 4 black groupers over 24 inches, and gag groupers over 24 inches, after the season for them opens on September 1st. You can make up the aggregate of four total groupers taken.

Cobia, a prized eating fish, can reliably be taken in Charlotte Harbor. They have to be at least 36 inches long, and have a bag limit of one per angler and 2 per vessel. From February to May, cobia tend to be found inshore and are often found following rays. For cobia, pass crabs are great bait.

Snook are now regulated by regions rather than statewide. We are in Region 9, the Charlotte Harbor Region. Snook may be harvested in this region with a slot requirement of 28 to 33 inches. Snook are fish that all start out as males, and around 32 inches morph into females,; the slot is designed to protect the breeding female population. Open seasons on snook in this region are the months of March and April and October and November.

The Officers advised using an App like "Fish Rules", which works off your geographic location, to help you fish in a legal manner. They also told us that there have been changes to the slow speed minimum wake laws and that there is a new law requiring boaters to stay 300 feet away from a marine emergency vessel with its lights on (law enforcement, Coast Guard, fire or rescue). This was an excellent presentation by these two officers, which the members loved.

We enjoyed wonderful weather during our March outing at Sirenia Vista Park. For April, we are planning to visit a new location to us, Knight's Landing in Bokeelia. Bokeelia is at the north end of Pine Island, located on the Great Calusa Blueway Paddling Trail, which is home to abundant marine life, shore birds and crustaceans. This 190 mile trail attracts water enthusiasts from all over the world, and is suitable for first-time kayakers to advanced paddlers.

Kayak rentals are available, but must be booked at least 24 - 48 hours in advance to ensure enough kayaks are available. Call 239-333-7332 or visit carmenskayaks.com to book a kayak. You can reserve a kayak on the website where you can pay and sign waiver all online, so when you arrive all you need to do is get in your kayaks and paddle. Carmen's Kayaks accepts cash, credit card/ debit card, Venmo and Cash App for payment.

Kayak rentals are \$25 for two hours; \$30 for three hours. Tandem kayaks are \$50 for three hours.



Bringing your own kayak/SUP? Knights' Landing offers a great ramp for kayaks/SUPs/canoes and small boats/watercrafts. There is ample parking for vehicles and trailers, as well as a clean restroom for patron use. Launch fee of \$5/kayak or SUP and \$10/boat is payable at the ramp and parking is included. Don't forget to bring a hat, sunscreen, and insect repellent.

After a morning of kayaking, we plan to go to lunch at nearby Cap'tn Con's Fish House, 8421 Main Street, Bokeelia. You'll enjoy the food, the water view, and the laid back atmosphere!
