Overboard and Drowning

The Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission (FWC) reported 67 boating related fatalities in 2017. Many of the deaths reported were the result of falling overboard and drowning. The FWC further reported that most of the deaths could have been prevented by the victims wearing life jackets, no surprise there. If the FWC reported why the persons fell overboard I could not find the report. On their website Boats US reports most causes of overboard incidents and subsequent drownings are the results of a person relieving themselves over the side of the boat from a standing position. Needless to say I was a little incredulous. A person drowning doesn't look like the typical splashing and yelling "Help I can't swim" as seen on television or in the movies . Nearly all drownings are silent. There are many stories of a lifeguard or other person rescuing someone who is drowning very near other persons who were unaware of the person drowning. Children have drowned with their parents nearby.

Signs of Silent Drowning

<u>Gasping</u>: A drowning person is focused on clearing their airway. If you can't breath you are not likely to waste breath on speech. The drowning person will be gasping which will be quiet.

Bobbing: A drowning person can rarely call out because their nose and mouth aren't above the water long enough to expel air and water, inhale and shout for help. Once someone is drowning, they alternately rise above the surface and sink below it .

Arms out to the sides: A drowning person rarely waves his arms above the surface. They will spread their arms to the side and press down on the water in an attempt to keep the nose and mouth above the water.

Floating face down: Near the end of the drowning a person may float facedown.

Education Department



CPR & AED

ABC classes continue on a monthly basis: Ted Dawson (Lead), Bill Harris and Tom Dawson (assist).

Seamanship will start on November 26, This will be a Monday/ Wednesday class which takes place from 7 to 9 PM Dan Patke (Lead)

Build boating confidence and competence for safe and fun on-the-water adventures. Seamanship provides a foundation of knowledge and skills in boat handling and maneuvering, boat operation, skipper's responsibilities, and boating techniques that will advance your boating enjoyment.

Junior Navigation is in progress: Ray Wlodkya (lead), Rick Clements (assist)



Subject matter includes:

Precise time determination

- Use of the Nautical Almanac
- Taking sextant sights of the sun
- Reducing sights to establish lines of position
- Special charts and plotting sheets for offshore navigation
- Offshore navigational routines for recreational craft

Electronic and computerized offshore navigation

In Junior Navigation, the student will continue to use GPS as the primary position sensor, as they learned to do in Piloting and Advanced Piloting. However, the offshore environment poses many different elements for consideration by the Navigator. Ocean currents, wind, and sea state all affect a vessel's performance over the longer passages.

Also, visible terrestrial landmarks are no longer available to the navigator as reference points. In the Junior Navigation course, the student will learn to substitute celestial objects such as the sun as reference points. The course begins with the study of celestial navigation, teaching the student to take sights on the sun with a marine sextant and derive a line of position from that observation. Next, the student will apply the principles learned in Advanced Piloting, and plot a running fix from two sun sights taken about four hours apart. Once the student has learned the basics of celestial sight reduction, the course continues with planning, positioning, and checking one's position in the offshore environment, using both electronic and celestial tools.

SAIL is in progress

It has been a number of years since we offered this course. SEABY, lead instructor, has many years of sailing experience.

The course starts with basic sailboat designs and nomenclature, rigging, safety, and sail processes and then tackles the physical aspects of sailing forces and techniques sail applications, marlinespike, helmsmanship and handling of more difficult sailing conditions, navigation rules, and an introduction to heavy weather sailing.

Piloting

This course is in progress, 7 to 9 PM Neil Pignatano Lead, (Jon Berning Assist)

Piloting is the first course in the sequence of USPS courses on navigation, covering the basics of coastal and inland navigation. This course focuses on navigation as it is done on recreational boats today and embraces GPS as a primary navigation tool while covering enough of traditional techniques so the student will be able to find his/her way even if their GPS fails. The course includes many in-class exercises, developing the student's skills through hands-on practice and learning. Ten classes of two hours each normally are scheduled for presentation of this course. In addition the students have seven days to complete the open book exam. Topics covered include:

- Charts and their interpretation
- Navigation aids and how they point to safe water
- Plotting courses and determining direction and distance
- The mariner's compass and converting between True and Magnetic
- Use of GPS typical GPS displays and information they provide, setting up waypoints and routes, staying on a GPS route.
- Pre-planning safe courses and entering them into the GPS

• Monitoring progress and determining position by both GPS and traditional techniques such as bearings and dead reckoning The "Seaman's Eye" – simple skills for checking that one is on course.

A number of us attended the Education Seminar at the District 22 Conference last month. We heard about a lot of changes coming soon and will keep posting changes as they are implemented.

On the **ccsaps.org** web site is a list of Advance and Elective classes. If anyone is interested in taking one of these, let us know and we'll try to set up a class.

We are looking forward to another great year in education!
