Cape Coral receives final DEP Order for Chiquita Lock Removal

The Florida Department of Environmental Protection (FDEP) has issued an Environmental Resource Permit (ERP) for the South Spreader Waterway Enhancement Project, which includes removal of the Chiquita Boat Lock, following the issuance of the Final Order.

"This milestone marks a pivotal moment in the City's efforts to improve waterway access and environmental conditions in the area," city officials said in a release issued today. "The City has already begun taking immediate steps to secure the necessary permits from the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers (USACE) to advance the lock removal project. Additionally, City officials have been in communication with the contractor responsible for the lock's removal to ensure the project progresses without delay."

An administrative law Judge issued a Recommended Order in June authorizing FDEP to grant the ERP to the city. The recommendation came after a multi-week evidentiary hearing concluded on Dec. 20, 2023.

"The Final Administrative Hearing was a crucial step in the permitting process, with the Judge ordering the Petitioner(s), the City, and FDEP to submit their proposed recommended orders by April 29, 2024. After careful consideration, the Judge determined that the City's ERP application met the necessary standards under Florida law and the Florida Administrative Code, leading to the issuance of the favorable Recommended Order," the city release states.

"The City of Cape Coral recognizes the importance of the South Spreader Waterway Enhancement Project and is committed to moving forward with the utmost care, adhering to any permit conditions."

How did Cattle Dock Point get its name? By Barret Bonden



The area has some interesting place names, but do you know their backstory? Harney Point was named after Col. William Harney who tried to establish a trading post in that area. It didn't last long and ended with the Harney Point Massacre in 1839.

Piney Point had lots of pine trees like the rest of the area that later became Cape Coral, but what about Cattle Dock Point, were there ever cattle there, was it ever a dock? It turns out there is still no clear answer to that question.

Back in April the Friends of the Cape Coral Library hosted its spring book sale, and I like to explore the special items table. This spring they had a couple of copies of Betzy Zeiss' book The Other Side of the River Historical Cape Coral. It piqued my interest, so I picked up a copy. Zeiss started visiting the area back in 1960 a time she claims "cows outnumbered people and rickety bridges linked dusty roads."

In her book, Zeiss sets out to capture the oral history of the area. She tracks down the descendants of those who tried to homestead the area before the Rosen's came in bulldozed the land-scape. In all it was a fascinating read and paints an interesting picture of the area from the early 1800's to the 1970's.

It surprises many people to learn that Florida was cattle country. The state rivaled the old west in many ways. The term Florida "crackers" came from the sound of the whips the cowboys used to herd cattle. Florida was open prairie until 1949 when the first fence laws were enacted.

Cattle from central and south Florida were shipped by rail or boat to the markets in the northern states. Up until the 1850's long horn cattle were herded either west to Punta Gorda or north to the rail lines near Tampa. In 1850, Cuba became a market for the Florida beef and a new port was needed.

The shipping point for Cuba moved south to Punta Rasa, and to get the cattle there they had to cross the Caloosahatchee River. The crackers would move their herds down from central Florida through Arcadia to Alva where they cattle could ford the river. Yes, that's right, somewhere just past the current lock the river had a place that cattle could wade across.

From there the crackers would follow the river south. Along the way passing through what is today downtown Ft. Myers on the way to Punta Rasa. That is until one successful rancher, "Big Jake" Daughtrey, decided to take another path.

Daughtrey had homestead 160 acres of land around the creek that now bears his name. After doing some exploring, he decided to herd his cattle down to either Harney Point or Cattle Dock Point. This is where the story gets murky. Before the mouth of the river was dredged, the early paddle-wheelers navigated up the river on the north side of Big Shell Island. Zeiss in all her interviews couldn't pin down if Daugherty used one or both of those places.

What she did tease out from the people she spoke with was in the 1970's there was still dock piling visible at Cattle Dock Point. Some old timers remember a barge that sat there for a long time prior to that time. The speculation was that Daughtrey may have used Cattle Dock Point as a place to ferry cattle down to Punta Rasa and from there to Cuba.

In either case it was fun to imagine cattle roaming free on the "other side of the river." It was also interesting to read the many stories of the early pioneers that tried to make a go of it here before the Rosen brothers showed up. Zeiss pointed out many places where early homesteaders lived that remain undeveloped even today along Pine Island Road. But that is another story.

SQUADRON EDUCATION OFFICER (SEO) SEO's Notebook: Welcome to 2024-25 Academic Year

How the time flies! Hard to believe that fall is almost here. And that means peak hurricane season is right around the corner (not that anyone reading this needs to be reminded). Be prepared and vigilant. I check the National Hurricane Center website (https://www.nhc.noaa.gov/) every morning for the latest and most accurate information on the tropics.

The 2024-25 academic year starts in earnest this month and runs through June, 2025. A diverse curriculum is being offered and contains subjects directly applicable to boating in our area. But before I get into that discussion, it has become traditional, at the beginning of the academic year, to recognize our members that have been awarded Advanced Grades by passing our Advanced Course offerings during the prior academic year. These advanced courses run six to seven weeks and are followed by a rigorous final examination, the passing grade for which is 80%.

For those that have taken the Boat Handling Class and passed the final exam, they are awarded the Advanced Grade of Seaman (S). Several of our members were awarded this grade: Edwin Estes, Thekla Fagerlie-Madsen, Don Schmitt, Randi Schmitt, and Daniel Silva. A special congratulations to Daniel for making a perfect score!

The grade of Advanced Pilot (AP) is awarded to those that pass the Advanced Marine Navigation course, by completing equivalent training with the USCG Auxiliary, or by successfully obtaining a USCG Captain's license. Daniel Waters successfully completed the Advanced Marine Navigation course. Thomas Dawson completed the equivalent USCG Auxiliary courses. Two of our USCG Captain members also were awarded their AP grades: Josh Wurtsbaugh and Michael Lynch. Well done and congratulations to all! Thank you for your commitment to continuing boating education.

The 2024-25 Academic Calendar has been posted on our website and all classes are open for registration online. As usual, ABC kicks things off on September 9. There is still plenty of space available, so spread the word. Subsequent ABC offerings are November 4, January 6, March 3 and May 5. ABC has proven to be very popular, and CCSAPS graduates more students than any other squadron in the country! And this is all thanks to the tireless efforts of our volunteer instructors (second to none) and the recruitment teams (Farmer's Market, social media, etc.). 2024-25 should prove to be no different.

The two-hour Introduction to Charting seminar occurs on September 26. This highly informative class introduces boaters to electronic navigation and the use of charts. These techniques are invaluable for those wanting to successfully navigate our local estuary. Charts is a "fancy" term for maps. Most of us are familiar with using Google maps (or equivalent) for driving. Knowing how to use charts is (almost) the same for getting around on the water. If you are unfamiliar with inshore and coastal piloting or just need a quick refresher, please consider attending.

The next offering of Boat Handling starts on October 8. This six-week Advanced course covers the subjects of the rules of the road, slow speed maneuvering (docking/undocking), underway handling, anchoring, emergencies, and knots and lines (marlinespike). If you are a recent graduate of ABC, this course will provide reinforcement for what was covered there. Of course, if it's been a while since you last attended ABC and want a refresher, this is the course for you. Subsequent offerings are January 6, March 11, and May 5. Completing the course and passing the final exam will earn you the Advanced Grade of Seaman.

Also coming up in October is a brand new six-week course entitled "Navigating SW Florida." This course picks up where the popular SW Florida Boating Primer left off. If you attended one of the Primer sessions, you were exposed to a very great deal of material in a short period (two hours) of time. This course provides detailed descriptions of the SW Florida waterways as well as in introduction to navigation using electronic tools. It is directed at the recreational boater and based upon over 300 hours of experience with actual piloting in the local waters. Electronic navigation techniques, using PCs, tablets, and smart phones, are covered in great detail. There will be homework and a final exam. By passing the final exam, students will receive academic credit for USPS Introduction to Navigation. This course starts on October 15, and will be offered again on February 11. Enrollment is limited, and I expect this course to fill up quickly.

And, of course, we have another offering of the informative "All About VHF/DSC Radio" seminar. This two-hour class provides an overview of the proper use of the second most important piece of safety equipment on board your vessel, your marine VHF radio. Learn how to correctly use the various radio channels for things like emergencies, urgent requests, and safety information, as well as for contacting other vessels and marinas. This seminar takes place on October 8, and is repeated on April 15.

In subsequent issues of SEO's Notebook, I will be previewing our other upcoming course and seminar offerings. But in the meantime, I encourage you to look at the calendar to see if there's anything else you'd like offered. Do not hesitate to contact me with your suggestions and/or requests and I'll do my best to accommodate you. I already know that many of you have requested basic boat and engine maintenance, as well as boat lift servicing seminars, and these are in work. However, there is no date for their offering at this time, although we are hoping to get something out in the March-April time frame.

If you are interested in becoming an instructor (no prior experience needed), please contact me and I will get you through the process (it's not hard, at all). We're looking for people with public speaking skills and a working knowledge of recreational boating. Whether you're an experienced weekend/weekday boater or a USCG Captain, I'd love to hear from you. This is especially true if there's a particular boating subject in which you are familiar. Contact me at education@ccsaps.org.

And, just to repeat, the Academic Calendar has been posted to the website and all courses and seminars are available for online registration, either via the website, or by scanning the appropriate QR codes on the subsequent pages of the Buoys. Also, should you have any questions or comments about our educational offerings, I'd like to hear from you. All inquiries are answered within 24 hours.

Co-Op Charting Group - Denny Pearson

The summer of 2024 proved to be more of a challenge with weather and schedules for the Co-Op Charting Group. The morning weather and sea conditions this summer required the rescheduling of a number of the ATON Verification Runs, some runs more than once.

In June the group completed two ATON Verification Survey Runs with a third run being rescheduled but not completed in June due to weather. The first run was on Thursday, June 6 with Captain Jim Humphrey and crew running Route G (Pine Island Sound to Redfish Pass, Captiva). Route G run logged 7 ATON/PATON discrepancies during their run and had a great morning on the water. The crew stopped at Rumrunner's in Cape Harbor for an enjoyable lunch before heading back to the home dock. Weather and sea conditions required the rescheduling of the next runs some more than once. The second run was scheduled for Saturday, June 8 with Captain Ken Goldman and crew running Route I (Matlacha Pass Bridge to Jug Creek, Bokeelia). Route I did launch the day of the run but had to abort in Matlacha Pass due to thick fog. The run rescheduled but did not get out in June due to weather. 



VESSEL SAFETY CHECK

What is a Vessel Safety Check (VSC)?

It is an opportunity to have your vessel's safety equipment examined by a qualified vessel examiner of the United States Power Squadrons. There are NO fines, penalties, or reports to any other agency.

If your vessel is properly equipped, you will be awarded a current VSC decal to display. Decal display does NOT guarantee that you will not be boarded.



Provided you do not remove any equipment, you'll have peace of mind knowing you have the required equipment in an emergency and know where it's located in the event you need it or are inspected by boating law enforcement.

What are the benefits of a VSC?

The VSC can identify SAFETY and money saving opportunities:

- 1 By meeting federal, state, and local safety equipment requirements you will prevent equipment related citations.
- 2 You may receive a boating insurance discount from your insurance provider.
- 3 By increasing awareness of safety practices you may avoid accidents and costly breakdowns.
- 4 The VSC can reduce accidents by educating the boater about the value and use of safety equipment and safe practices on the water.

- Annual Dues All members should have received an invitation from National HQ to sign in to the new Portal. The system at the National level that manages the Annual Dues process is approaching 30 years of age, both the software and the hardware. A Project has been underway to transition to a new cloud based platform based on iMIS, a suite of capabilities built to support organizations such as ours. The initial effort is focused on migrating our database records and managing the tasks of billing and taking payments for our 17,000 plus members. The project is on-going and has been handling the tasks since July with extensive manual intervention by HQ staff.

The base process remains similar to the past. Two months before the renewal date, the primary member (for Family memberships) or primary single members will receive an invoice for renewal payment and then follow up communications.
